

Developing

Faithful Leaders

The AAC provides two leadership development initiatives that are hands-on and practical. The Clergy Leadership Training Institute and the Lay Leadership Institute connect with leaders who are "on the ground" in their congregation and seek to help them with the challenges of ministry today. In 2015 the AAC trained over 200 lay and ordained leaders in the Anglican Church in North America.



Church ReVitalization: Turning Vision into Momemtum





Clergy Leadership Training Institute

Adressing the needs of Anglican clergy, the CLTI focuses on the "four C's" of clergy leadership development: character, competency, compound results, and church conflict skills. CLTI cohorts typically gather for three weeklong sessions over an 18 month period.

The AAC trained 75 clergy in 2015 in four separate CLTI's.

Lay Leadership Training Institute

A three day event designed to inform and equip lay leaders to better serve their parish and diocese. Topics range from basic principals of governance to how to deal with church conflict.

The AAC trained 115 lay leaders in January and February of 2015 in San Joaquin, CA.

The AAC sends out email updates on international Anglican events weekly from its Atlanta, GA offices. In addition, President Phil Ashey is completing canon law studies from Cardiff University in Wales. Canon Ashey finished his dissertation in 2015 and will publish in 2016.

The 2015 Provincial Council of the Anglican Church in North America provided the AAC an opportunity to connect with Anglican leaders, especially those in Vancouver, Canada where the council took place.


Equipping

the Church for Mission

The AAC's Church ReVitalization program teaches congregations and their leaders how to:

- 1. Assess their health
- 2. Refresh their Vision
- 3. Overcome barriers to growth
- 4. Move from an attitude of maintenance to mission

For instance, during our Church ReVitalization program we introduce leaders to the normal lifecycle of any church, and how the natural progression is from the left to the right (see below)—from incline, to recline, decline and death—unless of course, the local church and its leadership "jump the curve."



With many struggling congregations, there is a great demand for Church ReVitalization resources. To help meet that demand we hired a Director of Church Revitalization and Coaching, the Rev. Canon Steven Saul (right), in July, 2015.



The most important segment...was the 'Is Church Decline Inevitable?' session. The manner of teaching was very helpful as it made the concepts of incline, recline and decline clear in detail...

This teaching allowed (participants) to diagnosis their own condition and own it rather than be told their church's condition and then have to accept the findings on faith. Of course I was glad that our people all agreed about where we are as a church and especially that they are resolved to 'jump the curve'.

CHRISTIAN NETWORK

As a founding member of the Common Ground Christian Network, the AAC has continued to shape and grow a team of biblically based churches and leaders. Since our first trans-denominational gathering in October of 2012, the AAC helped organize 6 more events.

Our meetings in 2015 focused on challenges to religious freedom. Congressman Frank Wolf, and other strong voices for religious freedom in the U.S. and worldwide, addressed and networked with Anglican, Presbyterian, Lutheran, and Methodist leaders.


Canon Phil Ashey, President of the AAC, is on the Steering Committee of this new body, which continues to meet and work together as Biblically faithful Christians face the challenges of our day and our culture. These challenges include the Supreme Court's decision that federalized the redefinition of marriage, with potentially harsh consequences for the local church.

In September, Canon Ashey and Mr. Rich Baker—an expert in religious freedom law and AAC board member— addressed a regional gathering of Anglicans on how to practically strengthen the local church's witness and become lighthouses for religious freedom.
